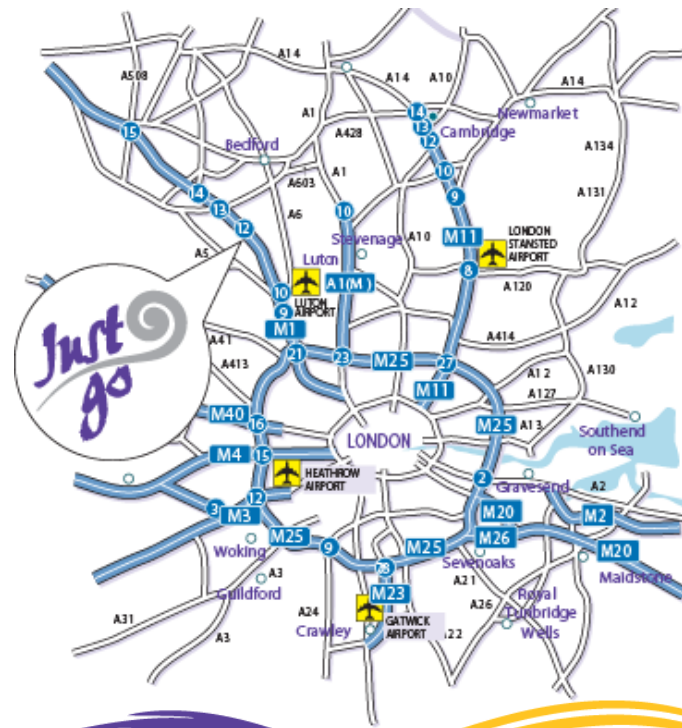
Campsite Thalkirchen

Munich, the capital of Bavaria, is home to centuries-old buildings and numerous museums. It is well known for its annual Oktoberfest celebration and cavernous beer halls, including the famed Hofbräuhaus, founded in 1589.

In the walkable Old Town, Marienplatz is a central square containing landmarks such as Gothic Neues Rathaus (town hall), with a popular glockenspiel show. Munich's walkable centre retains a small-town air but holds some world-class sights, especially art galleries and museums. Throw in royal Bavarian heritage, an entire suburb of Olympic legacy and a kitbag of dark tourism, and it's clear why southern Germany's metropolis is such a favourite among those who seek out the past but also like the nightlife.

Olympiapark, the site of the 1972 games, is not to be missed (you can skate on the Olympic ice rink and swim in the pool). On a more sombre note, take time to visit the concentration camp at Dachau—it's an intense, yet unforgettable, glimpse into the not-too-distant horrors of the Holocaust.

The natural habitat of well-heeled power dressers and Lederhosen-clad thigh-slappers, Mediterranean-style street cafes and Mitteleuropa beer halls, highbrow art and high-tech industry, Germany's unofficial southern capital is a flourishing success story that revels in its own contradictions. If you're looking for Alpine clichés, they're all here.



Places to visit

Royal Castles of Neuschwanstein and Linderhof Day Tour

Hidden in the seclusion of the Bavarian mountains, King Ludwig II built two of his dream castles, Neuschwanstein and Linderhof. This trip from Munich shows you both of these extraordinary castles, the legacy of Bavaria's fairy tale King. Capture the grandeur of these castles and the picturesque mountain scenery of Bavaria in one magical day.

Marienplatz

The centre of the old city, Marienplatz is also the very heart of Munich and a great place to start your day. The lively square was built in 1638 and was the site of tournaments and other festivities in the Middle Ages. It's still a hub of activity today, with several beautiful churches and great shops and restaurants on the streets branching off of it. The imposing Neo-Gothic Rathaus sits on the square, with its famed Glockenspiel, a fantastical tower adorned by dragons and gargoyles, which comes to life a few times each day, with figurines representing various events in Munich's history twirling around in a 12-minute show.

Viktualienmarkt

Viktualienmarkt has been in its current location since 1807 (after the food market grew too large for Marienplatz), and to this day remains a true paradise for food lovers. Here you'll find an array of fresh fruits, cheeses, meats, and spices from all over the world — alongside (most importantly) some excellent German foods. This is a great and inspiring spot to pick your way through breakfast or lunch.
