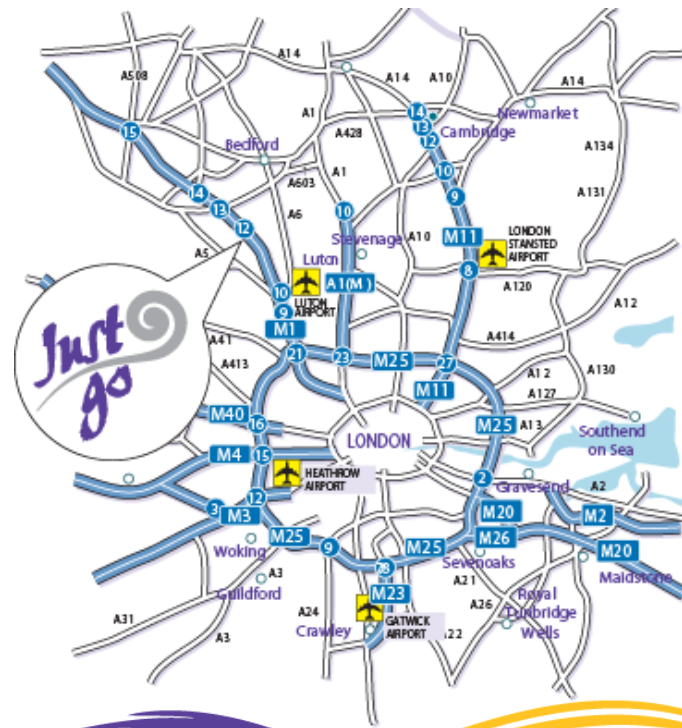
Campingplatz Stover Strand International

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Germany, Hamburg

Hamburg, a major port city in northern Germany, is connected to the North Sea by the Elbe River. It's crossed by hundreds of canals, and also contains large areas of parkland. Its central Jungfernstieg boulevard connects the Altstadt (old town) and the Neustadt, passing Binnenalster Lake, dotted with boats and surrounded by cafes and restaurants. Oysters and traditional Aalsuppe (soup) are local specialties.

The Old Town is indeed Hamburg's oldest district and the real attraction for many tourists. The most famous, of course, are the Chilehaus and the office buildings on Burchardplatz, but the Sprinkenhof, Mohlenhof and the Messberghof are also considered popular tourist destinations. The "Old Elbe Tunnel", however, remains unchallenged.

Second only to Berlin in size and population, the city of Hamburg is home to one of the biggest harbours in Europe. A stroll along its many waterways and canals illustrates why it has been called the "Venice of the North." Don't miss a trip to the local fish market (Fischmarkt), the Merchants District (marked by its imposing red-brick architecture), a fine dining experience along the river or a night out in the university quarter. And did we mention the Reeperbahn (red light district)? It's quite famous for its... red lights.

It values its status as being as independent as possible of other states that have existed or currently exist in Germany. Over the centuries, Hamburg has always been an international city. This is not only because of its position in international trade, but also in political dimensions.



Places to visit

Numerous museum ships

Numerous Museum ships in Hamburg offer tourists the opportunity to learn more about this city's shipping history. They are witnesses to history and they document the development of the Port of Hamburg: Cap San Diego, Lightship or Rickmer Rickmers, each of these ships has influenced the history of the harbour.

Hanseatic City

A trip to the popular Hanseatic city should also include a visit to the many museum ships in Hamburg. These are former passenger liners or barges that have been converted into museums. During a visit to one of these special ships, both residents and tourists can learn about the history of the city as a shipping and trading post. Each of the museum ships, which also document the development of the harbour, have had their influence on it over the years.

Marktzeit in der Fabrik

Flea & Street Markets
Situated in the Ottensen neighborhood, Fabrik is a former machine parts factory turned local cultural center with lots of fun activities. Every Saturday, this space becomes a cozy indoor market showcasing local artists and food sellers. It's a great place to shop for souvenirs, or just hang out with some snacks!
